Économie de l'attention

- ▶ “Economics, as we all remember from *Introduction to Economics*, studies the allocation of scarce resources. Normally we should think that the phrase “information economy,” which we hear everywhere nowadays, makes some sense. [. . .] But information is not in short supply in the new information economy. We’re drowning in it. What we lack is the human attention needed to make sense of it all. It will be easier to find our place in the new regime if we think of it as an economics of attention. Attention is the commodity in short supply.” (Lanham vi)

OLP

- ▶ "I mean the method of reducing the explanation of natural phenomena to the smallest possible number of primitive natural laws; and, in mathematics, of unifying the treatment of different topics by using a generalization. Philosophers constantly see the method of science before their eyes, and are irresistibly tempted to ask and answer in the way science does. This tendency is the real source of metaphysics, and leads the philosopher into complete darkness. I want to say here that it can never be our job to reduce anything to anything, or to explain anything. Philosophy really is 'purely descriptive'." (Wittgenstein 1965, 18)

OLP

- ▶ “ordinary language is not to be envisioned only as having a descriptive, or even agentive function, but as a perceptual instrument that allows for subtlety and adjustment in perceptions and actions” (Laugier 2015a, 232)
- ▶ “Thus OLP is from the outset oriented towards social matters and *attention to the unseen, to neglected reality*. Its primary methodological ambition is a conceptual analysis that would make it possible to recognize the importance of context in the practice of language, thought and perception” (Laugier 2015a, 228; souligné par mes soins).
